

# Mutual Understanding of Criminal Records Information Project (MUCRI)

Findings in relation to identity

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# **Aim of the Project**

To enhance the mutual understanding of exchanged criminal records information by identifying problems and challenges experienced by member states and making recommendations for future improvement



## Methodology



- Focus group with UKCA-ECR staff
- Initial questionnaire sent to the central authorities of all member states (excluding UK) – completed by 23 member states
- Detailed questionnaire completed by 17 member states
- Interview/Observation 7 member states visited



## **Key Challenges**



- Verifying identity
- Understanding translations
- Information on and layout of conviction certificate
- Understanding offences
- Understanding sanctions
- Obtaining/requiring additional information
- Communication between central authorities
- 'Other' issues (ECRIS volumes, understanding other jurisdictions, lack of information exchanged, requests)




## **Key Statistics**





- 75% of member states experienced challenges in verifying the identity of the convicted person
- 70% of member states experienced challenges in verifying identity in relation to notifications received from the UK
- 100% of interviewed member states with a centralised population register/identity database raised verification of identity as a significant issue
- 70% of member states which exchange fingerprints are based either within the interior ministry or the police service
- 63% of member states central authorities based within the police exchange fingerprints with at least one other member state


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












### **Conclusions**



- Identification requirements for each member state to be collated and shared with all member states
- Training to be provided to criminal justice professionals as to what identification information is required by each member state to ensure it is collected
- A standard set of identification requirements across all member states would be beneficial



## Recommendations



- The information required for verifying identity in each member state to be collated into a central, updatable document and each member state to consider providing training to the relevant criminal justice professionals to ensure the required information is captured.
- The European Commission to work with member states to develop a standard set of acceptable identification information.
